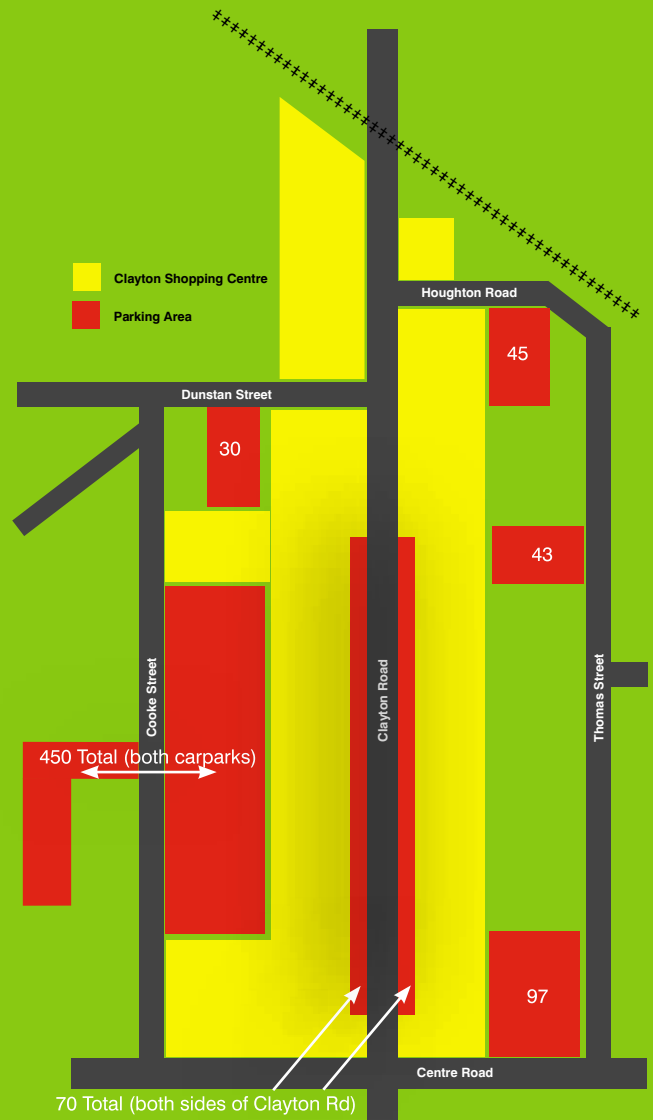

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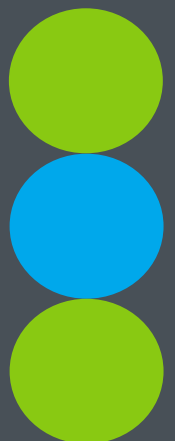
# Parking in the Clayton Shopping Centre

You may have recently noticed us patrolling the shopping centre and in particular policing the Clayton Rd. pedestrian crossings at the railway line.

We have been paying particular attention to pedestrians illegally crossing the railway line while the warning lights and bells are going. We have been issuing many fines for this offence and people just don't seem to be getting the message.

We will continue to police this problem for as long as it takes.

We are all terrified that we will have that day at work no-one wants to have when a train collects one or more people ignoring the warning signals.

Please pass on to everyone you know who uses the crossing that it is extremely dangerous behaviour to cross against the warning signals and that the local police and Highway Patrol are giving the area much attention. If we catch you doing the wrong thing, the fine is currently around \$300.

We don't get any pleasure booking people for this offence but we make no apology as we don't want accidents.

On a brighter note it appears that the number of calls for police assistance in the shopping centre is decreasing. We understand that this may not continue and we will have visible patrols in the area when we can.

Clayton Police Station operates from 8am – 4pm Mon- Fri. A 16 hr patrol response is provided and Oakleigh provide a 24 hr patrol response.

# Heartfelt Effort For Cardiac Equipment.

We all know hospitals can be intimidating places, especially for children.

Our staff work hard to make our children's wards more pleasing with bright colours, paintings and child friendly spaces. But until recently, children and babies that had heart problems were restricted to the adult wards as cardiac monitoring equipment wasn't available. This meant being away from other children on adult wards without anything nice to look at or other child friendly diversions – making it a really difficult time for patients and families.

In June, Monash Children's launched a campaign to raise \$100,000 to purchase four portable monitors.

We are delighted to say the response from our community and staff was immediate and overwhelming.

Over 100 participants joined in the hugely successful Monash Children's Run Melbourne 2011 which raised over \$30,000 towards the monitors.

Major donations from white goods manufacturer ASKO, Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC) and Monash Surgical Private Hospital plus significant community support combined to make the campaign a real success.

In total we raised \$100,234 and can now purchase the required cardiac monitors. This will improve the hospital stay for many children and their families as we will be able to treat children requiring heart monitoring in the children's wards.

A celebratory evening was held on Wednesday 24 August 2011 at Monash Medical Centre Clayton to say thank you to everyone who contributed to this campaign.

# CLAYTON'S HISTORY

## History of Clayton

### Mulgrave Arms Hotel

Thomas Irwin, native of County Tyrone, Ireland, came out to Victoria in 1851 and went to Bendigo diggings for six months. Having no luck, he lived privately in Melbourne for a short time, then in June 1859, he went to Oakleigh where he built the Mulgrave Arms Hotel on the Dandenong Road, about half a mile west of East Boundary Road. When the hotel was licenced on 19th August 1859, Thomas became the licensee of the first hotel in the district. Although various members of the family were licensees, the hotel continued in their name until 1902 when it was sold to Bonhams.

The hotel was always an overnight stop for Cobb & Co. coaches going to and from Gippsland. Whilst the travellers wined and dined, the horses rested in a paddock. On 28th June 1860, Thomas Irwin became a member of the first Roads Board known as Oakleigh and Mulgrave Road District. He was elected to Oakleigh Council and later served on the Mulgrave Council. The first meeting of this Council was held in the lounge room of the Mulgrave Arms Hotel where they decided on a plan for the Council Chambers. Until these were built the Council continued to hold their meetings at the hotel.

When Mr. Bonham became licensee he was instrumental in organising the start of a big annual cycling race from outside his hotel for a number of years. During the Bonham's early years, Mr. Norman started his grocery business in Oakleigh. The hotel was one of his best customers and every six months Mr. Norman could be seen wheeling a trolley of groceries along the Dandenong Road to the Bonhams. As years went by he progressed, and could then be seen delivering the groceries by horse and cart.

Miss Nancy Bonham, the last surviving child of Mr and Mrs. Bonham, can remember some life at the hotel before it was delicensed in 1923. She recalls Doherty's as being the local grocer in the district and the election meetings being held in the old Tennis Hall. She also remembers hotels being open until 11 pm, and on occasions fights would break out in the bar. but her father would always put an end to them quickly.

A post office man who called one day was horrified they did not have a telephone and in no time the hotel was connected to the Oakleigh exchange. This made life so much easier for them. They were possibly the first private citizens in the area to have a phone.

Mr and Mrs Bonham and family lived on in the hotel, which was a landmark until 1944 when it was demolished to make for the first motel in Victoria. The Pine trees which Thomas Irwin had planted around his hotel in the early days also disappeared in 1944.

## THE 1860's

James and Sarah Murphy (nee Mulrooney) arrived from Ireland and purchased their first land in Glenferrie Road, Malvern (where Stonnington is now). As this area became populated, they sold out and purchased 40 acres on the east side of East Boundary Road, Mordialloc (next to William Audsley) and later 30 acres on the opposite side of the road. Soon after arriving in our bush Sarah went blind and never saw her children.

Fortunately the Writer interviewed their grand-daughter, Eileen, shortly before her sudden death in December, 1973 and later a great-grandson, Eric Crowe. Eileen, like her father William, before her, was born in our area. She recalled her father telling how, as a young man, together with other local lads, walked to North Brighton station on a Saturday evening to catch the train into the City to go to a dance as there were no trains to Melbourne on the local line. After the dance they caught the last train to North Brighton and walked home. This was the nearest dance in his young days. She went on to say that she was much better off, as in her teenage days, the locals only had to walk through the scrub to Springvale to a dance and walk home again at midnight.

As a child she remembered Rosella parrots and Galahs being part of the bird life around her home. Wild flowers were in abundance and consisted of spider orchids, tiny pink orchids which grew only two inches high and were to be found in only one small patch in the district - down the back of their property. There were lots of flowering shrubs which disappeared during her childhood - because of thieves being prevalent in the area. Wild heath both pink and white and sometimes red, together with correas, boronias and many varieties of eggs and bacon were in abundance.

Clayton North School had already been established and she attended there for one year. After that, she rode a bike to St. Peter's Roman Catholic School in Centre Road, East Bentleigh, where she completed her education. She recalled her father talking about the Mordialloc tribe of Aboriginals roaming the area, but the Government would not allow them to wander past Brighton. Shopping for her mother and father was not easy as their nearest shopping centre was Brighton, but often her father brought supplies home from the market. In later years it became easier because Oakleigh had become a good place for shopping too.

Eileen spoke of the other Murphy family, but no relation. Rose ran the post office and sister Delia ran the store, first on the south side of the railway near the station, then on the north side (just down from the Commonwealth Bank). She remembered the gate-house which stood on the south side of the railway near the gates.

She stated that during her teenage years the old public hall was brought to Clayton. It was half an Army hut from Seymour and was transported to our settlement after the First World War. Her father, together with Mr. Scott and others were the Trustees. William, her father, walked to work at the Lysterfield Quarries, leaving home at 6 am and arriving home again at 7 pm each day. He was a very thrifty man as on one occasion he had the toothache and planned to visit a dentist at Oakleigh, but before doing so, heard of a dentist at Williamstown who extracted teeth for less, so he rode his bike out there to have the offending tooth removed.

In 1908 their property was valued at £1,100 (\$2,200). We all, no doubt, admire the courage of Sarah Murphy with such a disability coping under hard conditions in a strange country to care for her husband and rear their children. James and Sarah died near the turn of the century and are buried at Springvale.

"On 21st May 1921, Mr and Mrs W. Murphy (Eileen's parents) were given a farewell in the Clayton Hall as they had decided to lease the old homestead and farm to settle in Glenhuntly. A big attendance was there to see Mr. F. A. Bunny present them with three pieces of solid silver suitably inscribed for their services to the public. Miss Murphy received a dainty gold brooch set with rubies. There was dancing, vocal items and a good supper. Mr. Murphy responded to the cheering crowd." (Oakleigh and Caulfield Times 26th June 1921.)

# 'Strengthening Clayton & Clarinda' Project – Building Your Community Voice

There has been a great deal happening around the 'Strengthening Clayton & Clarinda' Project since the last Traders Newsletter back in July. The Project has been working closely with Swinburne University and Dixon House on a project to assess the needs of international students living in the area.

The Swinburne students developed a survey that was circulated to international students at Monash University and other tertiary institutions. The survey sought feedback on services they have used and information they would like to see about the area. The result will be the production of a local information guide for international students and their families in the area. The end of the project was marked by a community celebration for international students and their families at Dixon House.



We had a fantastic turnout at the recent VicRoads community workshop to discuss the Clayton and Centre Road rail crossings. Over 100 local residents explained how the crossings impact on their lives and what they would like to see done about them. Results of the study will be published in a rail crossing strategy for the Pakenham and Cranbourne lines between Grange Road, Caulfield East and South Gippsland Highway, Dandenong South.

If you have used the Clayton Library computers recently you will have seen details about the 'Strengthening Clayton & Clarinda' Project and details of how to get involved or leave your comments. 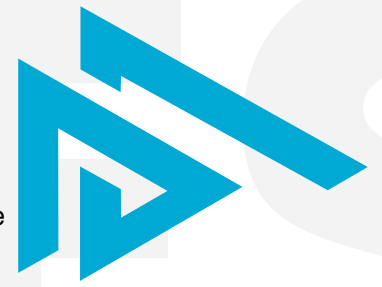
